1.	Acceptance of Apologies for Absence	7.01.014
	Apologies were accepted from Andy Brock (AB)	
	The Chair welcomed SS to her first Board meeting. Trustees introduced themselves.	
	The appointment of PC and SS from the 1 June 2025 by Members' resolution was noted. Aron Whiles has stepped down from the Trust Board effective from 7 July 2025.	
2.	Declarations of Interest with regard to agenda items	
	There were no declarations of interest.	
	Trustees were reminded to complete a new form during the year if there are any updates with regards pecuniary interests.	
3	Agree minutes of last meeting and Matters arising not on this agenda	
	The minutes and confidential minutes from 20 May 2025 were agreed as a true record.	
4.	Strategy 2030 (JC)	
	Associated papers: Anglian Learning Strategy 2030 v2.2	
	Trustees were presented with the final version of the strategy which has undergone extensive consultation. JC reminded them of the three priorities (which have had some wording changes): • Belonging by Design • Great Schools • Connected Communities	
	The strategy sets out the goals and how these will be achieved. It will need to be adaptable and responsive to external changes.	
	Q Has there been any feedback on the metrics? A There is work to be done on the KPIs and we have started to talk with HTs about this. Q Where you include Governance in Priority 3 should this specify local	
	governance? A Whilst we will be focussing on the local tier, the relationship across the tiers of governance is important. The structure of governance is the responsibility of the Board and it is important to align the local tier with the strategy. Q A query was raised over the use of the phrase 'climate emergency' and how appropriate this was and how it might be received. There was	

also a question over whether it was right to elevate AI and climate in particular as a priority.

A JC confirmed that inclusion was deliberate and had been debated. Al was more generic but a change could be made to the climate priority.

The Board approved the strategy subject to a change of wording in relation to climate emergency priority.

5. School Improvement Strategy: core standards

Associated papers: <u>AL Core Standards Master v3.2</u> Core Standards Guidance for Leaders v1.0.pdf

Following wide consultation the 9 Core Standards have been modified. The headings of each will be shared with stakeholders whilst the detail is for headteachers, and a guidance document has been produced to support this. This currently aligns with the Ofsted framework.

Q Will self-evaluation map to these standards rather than the Ofsted framework?

A Yes, we already have school performance overviews linked to standards which will be developed.

Trustees emphasised the importance of remaining vigilant to potential risks, even in schools that are meeting the standards. They highlighted the need to be aware of factors that might impact these schools. CM confirmed that we are reviewing our approach to risk.

Q How is the new approach being received by headteachers? **A** We believe this is a simpler system to the Blueprints but we handle any change sensitively, understanding that there may be apprehension

Trustees acknowledged the considerable work on the standards and the strategy which they approved.

6. Icknield Primary Ofsted Inspection (JC)

Associated papers: <u>10345538 Final report cover letter</u> 10345538-The Icknield Primary -148454 - Final

Following the recent Ofsted inspection The Icknield Primary school has been rated Good and Outstanding in the various categories. We are very pleased with the report and feel it is an accurate representation. In response to the previous inspection, which was Good but declining, the Trust provided additional support, including an interim academy council under the leadership of an executive headteacher.

JC informed Trustees that Howard Primary Academy was also recently inspected. The judgements are Good with Personal Development being Outstanding. JC explained the context for the school, highlighting the RI judgment at the 2023 inspection; Anglian Learning has invested heavily to turn things around.

All Anglian Learning primary schools are now rated Good or Outstanding. JC thanked the team especially Rachael Johnson and Laura Rawlings and this was echoed by Trustees.

Trustees noted that the story of Howard Primary would be worth writing as an example of no school left behind.

7. Growth update (JC)

Staploe Education Trust (SET)

Transfer of SET is proceeding as scheduled. The Staff consultation has been completed. Duncan Cooper will be the Acting Accounting

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Officer for SET in the autumn term, and we will be providing executive services, aligning the trust ready for transfer on 1 Jan 2026. **Pippins Nursery** The Pippins nursery at Icknield Primary School is transferring into Anglian Learning on 1 Sep 2025. The TUPE process has ended and there just remain some legalities to complete. The remainder of this item is recorded as a confidential minute 8. Approval of 2024/25 budgets and 3-year financial forecast (CM) Associated papers: Budget Setting Report 2025-26 V2.0 A balanced budget has been set for 2025-26, though the challenges to achieve this should be noted, including the collective consultation that has taken place with HR support. There are still uncertainties around pay awards, pension contributions and additional school budget support grants. Continuing challenges include: Sawston Village College rebuild. SET school Growth – SET schools reflected in central budget budgets to be Pupil numbers declining brought back There will be a particular focus on some schools in the autumn. in the Autumn. Reserves are below our own policy and DfE best practice. FEOC has requested management to model what a faster recovery would look like. The Chair acknowledged the enormous challenge and thanked CM and the team for the comprehensive report and all their hard work. Trustees commented that it might be useful to look ahead to see what it would take to make 2027-28 and 28-29 balanced. **Q** What causes the significant budget changes in later years? A We are required to submit a 3-year outline to the DfE. Years 4 and 5 always look challenging as assumptions retain current staff who progress up the pay spines. It is also difficult to predict SEND funding. 9. **Management Accounts P9 (CM)** Associated papers: P09 Management Accounts 2024-25 P09 IMP forecast reports combined The Trust Board noted the management accounts which had been discussed at FEOC. The expected outturn is a deficit against a budgeted surplus. Alternative Provision (AP) and supply costs have caused the greatest variances Actions implemented include financial regulations revisions with regard to AP and supply, additional monitoring and flags in the finance system. There will be a greater focus for everyone and those headteachers with significant budget overspends will need to attend FEOC. **Q** Has there been any change in headteacher responsibility? A No, but this responsibility has diminished over time. We must ensure that headteachers are equipped with the relevant skills. Q Have you considered internal supply? A This presents some geographical challenges, but we are looking at how other trusts manage this and are considering. Ther may need to

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be a bespoke arrangement for each school. There are some informal arrangements currently.

Q Is there an appetite for restricting supply where there is an overspend?

A Yes, this will be managed with the additional capacity provided by the Deputy Directors of Education so that those challenging conversations can be had.

Q *Is there evidence of the impact of supply teaching on educational outcomes?*

A Only anecdotal but the quality of supply is variable.

Q Given the low pupil numbers, will Wimbish be sustainable?

A We are developing plans to bring to the Board in the autumn.

10. Risk Management (CM)

Associated papers: Annual report on Risk Management July 2025

CM presented the annual risk report which has been considered by the Audit and Risk Assurance Committee.

Key points to note:

- Have refocused strategic risks to align with Strategy 2030. Will
 revise causes and effects to be more relevant
- Risk appetite have split out where there were 2 levels. Change to Quality of Education to move to more cautious.
- Schools are struggling to engage so pausing use of 4Risk. We know risk management is happening, but we need to consider how they record this in an effective way.

It was noted that the LGB planner still includes risk reviews. It is important that meaningful discussions are taking place but 4Risk may not be the best tool for schools.

Q How important is it externally, say for Ofsted?

A It is not relevant not for Ofsted but is most important internally for internal audit activity and for the Board to drive priorities.

Trustees expressed some concerns around wording in relation to the new Governance risk as whilst we would be open in terms of remodelling this would not be the case for compliance. Additionally, they cautioned about taking risks with culture. It was agreed that further discussions by the Board are needed in the autumn term.
