Cultural Leadership Event


Bottisham Village College was pleased to host the third annual Cultural Leadership Event in October, with over 20 arts teachers and leaders from across Anglian Learning attending. This year the event was split into five sessions taking a different look at collaboration and building creative partnerships.

Session 1 had a dance focus, with Alison Weir, Headteacher at Howard Community Academy, sharing the experience of the Digital Primaries Programme run by DanceEast that both Howard Community Academy and The Icknield Primary School had taken part in, and Helen Frost, Head of Dance and Enrichment Lead at Linton Village College, discussing the impact of Linton Village College's working collaboratively with the Hofesh Schechter Dance Company.

Tin Forest project (see page 2 for more details) led by Emma Mason, Music Subject Lead at Linton Heights Junior School, on behalf of the Trust, working in partnership with project lead, Kate Romano, Chief Executive and Artistic Director at Stapleford Granary. We are incredibly grateful to Kate Romano for guiding us through the development of this project and for sharing the creative and logistical expertise that made this collaboration possible. In Session 3 Emma Andrews, Music Teacher at Bottisham Village College, discussed the founding of the Bottisham Music Centre, while Lesley Morgan, Trust Arts Development Manager, and Alison Weir related their experiences of working with Arts Societies. Session 4 began with Nick Bell, Head of Drama at Sawston Village College, discussing the benefits of offering LAMDA in school, while Katie Street, Deputy Headteacher at Stapleford Community Primary School, Lesley Morgan and Helen Frost all outlined different models for delivering Arts Award.

The final session of the day was a collaboration and planning session to explore future events to increase community engagement and the diversity of curriculum experience for pupils across Anglian Learning. All in all, the day went well, with those in attendance giving positive feedback.

Inspire25: The Tin Forest at Stapleford Granary

Over three days in October, 520 pupils plus their teachers from our 11 Anglian Learning primary schools made the journey to Stapleford Granary to step into a musical and theatrical adventure.

The event, created uniquely for our pupils by Kate Romano (CEO and Creative Director of Stapleford Granary) and Emma Mason (Music Subject Lead, Linton Heights Junior School), was designed to inspire. From mechanical birds and human sound machines, to body percussion and group singing, every child became an integral part of the performance, which involved movement, puppetry, sound, song, imagination and more.

The unique twinning between a specialist culture and arts provider and our Trust has enabled the Granary's Small Grains project to flourish from a partnership with one primary school into a widening collaboration with a shared vision.

Our pupils were welcomed into Stapleford Granary's atmospheric foyer, ahead of entering the Concert Hall, where a bespoke soundscape and lighting sequence set the scene. The story of the Tin Forest, by author Helen Ward, was accompanied by beautiful projected illustrations by Wayne Anderson. There were no additional words, no verbal directions, no 'shushing', all instructions were given via hand signals, props, signs, demonstrations and body movements. It worked beautifully, and for 40 glorious minutes, we were all totally immersed in The Tin Forest.

Pupils and staff alike were inspired by their visit to the Granary, and once back at school, pupils reflected on their experience through further arts research and sharing of their work. This has resulted in a large, mass completion of DISCOVER Arts Awards, currently a project that is nearing completion and will be something to share next term. Watch this space...

Platform 25 Art Exhibition

Primary Platform 26 Launch at Kettle's Yard

Anglian Learning reached an exciting milestone with the launch of Primary Platform 26 at the inspiring Kettle's Yard gallery. This new initiative celebrates creativity, collaboration, and community across our 11 primary schools, giving younger pupils their own stage for the very first time.

Building on the success of Platform 25 for secondary schools, Primary Platform 26 will showcase artwork from Reception to Year 6 under the theme 'Belonging'; a powerful concept every child deserves to explore and express. The exhibition will take place from 6 to 8 March at the Marven Centre, Sawston Village College, featuring selected pieces from each school. A huge thank you to *Teaching Personnel* and *Vision* for their generous sponsorship in making this vision a reality.

A further three primary schools, set to join Anglian Learning in January, also took part, with everyone working with artist Dr Harold Offeh and the Kettle's Yard team. Participants explored the house and Harold's exhibition through creative activities that asked:

"What brings joy?"
"How are relationships shown?"
"What symbolises togetherness?"

They produced responses, a sound piece to represent 'welcome' and a photo to symbolise 'presence', sparking ideas for how pupils can express *belonging* back in their schools. The day culminated in the Clore Learning Studio, where Art Leads curated sketches, audio, and mixed media into collaborative artworks. This creative energy sets the stage for innovative projects across Anglian Learning.

Our ambition is clear: to make Primary Platform 26 a vibrant celebration of belonging that resonates in every classroom and every community.

Arts Highlights from Linton Heights Junior School

Finding our voices to sing

On Thursday, 9 October, Helen Juckes, Director of Music, Linton Village College, and Emma Mason, Music Subject Lead, Linton Heights Junior School, were excited to lead SingFest25. This annual singing event has been a highlight of our Linton schools' calendar for many years, as children in Year 2 from Linton Village College's feeder primary schools come together every Autumn term to sing. This year, children from Linton Infants, Castle Camps, Burrough Green and Great Abington Primary Schools joined 63 Linton Heights Junior School Year 5s plus Linton Village College Year 10 musicians. Each school had prepared a solo song, and Linton Heights Junior School pupils taught everyone a singing round with an autumnal theme. Linton Village College pupil, Amelie Phillips, sang a Disney Medley, accompanied by Mila Greathead on the piano. Year 10 live musicians accompanied the Year 5 song 'I am' and the finale song 'Autumn Says Hello'. We heard their instruments demonstrated as well, including a violin, a tenor saxophone and a flute.

It was a really special morning of singing and friendship, as we also made time to enjoy snacks and some social time with the 170 pupils altogether in the Sports Hall. You can hear everyone singing a song that our Year 5s taught to everyone else by clicking here.

Linton Heights Junior School Choir and our Year 6 pupils have also enjoyed using their singing voices in the community this term. The Choir have taken part in two events at St Mary's Church, Linton. Firstly, performing 'Peaceful World' at the Linton Remembers: Remembrance Service and secondly performing alongside Cambridge Chorale, directed by Robert Brooks, who are one of the most accomplished adult choirs in the country. The concert, which was arranged by Linton Music Series, provided inspiration for our pupils to experience in the build up to Christmas. Meanwhile, our Year 6 pupils visited two local homes for older members of our community with Mr Wilson. The annual Year 6 carol singing is a beautiful way to bring together our pupils with residents of Symonds House and Nicolls Court, singing and sharing time together.


Time May Pass, But We Will Never Forget: A tribute in Our Great Hall

This Remembrance Day, Joyce Frankland Academy pupils came together to create a powerful and moving tribute to honour those who served and sacrificed in the two World Wars. In the heart of the school's Great Hall, where the names of fallen members of our school are etched into history, the clock now ticks again, marking time not just in minutes, but in memory. Above the names, the old wooden balcony framed the installation. From its centre, the clock stands as a symbol of remembrance brought back to life. Flowing gently from the balcony to the ground below are hundreds of handmade poppies, each crafted by our pupils. These poppies represent individual acts of reflection and gratitude, cascading like a river of remembrance down to the hall.

We named this installation "Time May Pass, But We Will Never Forget", a reminder that while years may move forward, the legacy of those who gave everything remains rooted in our hearts. Each tick of the clock is a promise: we will remember.

From Moonlight to Madness: The Addams Family Bewitches at Bottisham Village College

Over three unforgettable sold-out nights, Bottisham Village College brought The Addams Family musical to life in a production that was as hilarious as it was heartfelt. With a remarkable company of 72 pupils which alternated between two casts, the show demonstrated the depth of talent, dedication and creativity thriving within our performing arts department.

From the moment the gates swung open, audiences were transported into the creepy, gothic world of the Addams clan. Both casts delivered outstanding performances, balancing sharp comedic timing with the story's unexpected warmth. Gomez and Morticia's offbeat chemistry was as charming as it was eccentric, Wednesday's transformation was portrayed with conviction and wit, and of course, Uncle Fester's moonlit antics never failed to delight the crowd. The ensemble performers, from the spectral ancestors to the wonderfully dramatic family members, brought energy, humour and depth to every scene.

Musically, the production shone, as the orchestra was exceptional. Mastering The Addams Family score is no small feat; the music is rhythmically complex, stylistically diverse, and demands absolute precision from every player. The pupils and staff rose to this challenge with remarkable skill and such confidence. Their musicianship not only supported the performers on stage but lifted the entire show, giving it the richness and vibrancy of a truly professional production. The technical team also deserves high praise. The exceptional staging and atmospheric lighting gave the true Addams aesthetic that enhanced the storytelling throughout. By the end of the run, there was an electric charge of energy; the cast were glowing with pride, the crew were celebrating their success, and audiences left talking about their favourite moments.

As Artistic Director/Performing Arts Teacher Katy Palmer reflected, "It has been an absolute pleasure to work with this cast. Both our lead casts are fantastic, and each performer brings their own unique style to their roles. The ancestors have worked hard on their musical numbers and characterisation, which has really helped create the spooky world of the show. It has been lovely to have such an incredibly supportive team of staff and pupils who have all made this process so enjoyable."

Most importantly, the show showcased what happens when a school community fully embraces ambition, creativity and teamwork. Pupils supported one another at every stage, from rehearsals to the final curtain. The production did not just entertain and impress our evening audiences; it also inspired the next generation of performers when one of our local primary schools came to watch the dress rehearsal. The Addams Family bewitched audiences with its haunting charm, showcased incredible talent, and reminded us all why the performing arts matter so deeply at Bottisham Village College.
